Iphiclides podalirius and Foeniculum vulgare

Iphiclides podalirius, or **"Scarce swallowtail** " is a big-size butterfly of the family Papilionidae, and one of the most cosmopolitan species in Europe except of northern parts. Adults fly from March to October, hovering and gliding while flying with their aerodynamic shape and movements bring us a magical sensations.

They feed on a variety of plants, loving the Rosaceae, Asteraceae and Umbelliferae/Apiaceae families among others. There are one, two, or three generations a year. The "**Fennel**," <u>Foeniculum vulgare</u>, is a favourite. I can recall this beautiful butterfly to the neighbourhood of Varia in Mytilene, in late Spring, where while collecting some fresh stems of fennel "αγριομάραθο" to add in brine to prepare for delicious Greek pickles and olives, "τουρσιά χαι ελιές " with my friend Πάρης.
