Zerynthia polyxena, or "Southern Festoon" is a beautiful rare nice-sized butterfly of the family Papilionidae, widespread in the middle and southern Europe . It can be found in warm, sunny and open spaces.

The carterpillars feed on birthworts (Aristolochia sp.). The special food of the larvae/carterpillars provides the toxic substances which then also go to the adults, making them unpalatable. Aristolochia parvifolia.

Among many other spots, I can relate this beautiful butterfly to the North region of Lesvos, and the village of Argenos, where by luck, I saw one and teased my curiosity, providing to me feelings of interest and novelty.

Like perhaps the Greek poet Ανδρέας Εμπειρίχος, "Andreas Embirikos" asserts in his poem "Υψικάμινος".
